

Next Steps

Keep reading the Bible. You could read another gospel (perhaps John's Gospel), or the story of the early church (Acts).

Keep attending church on a Sunday to learn more from the Bible and be with people learning more about how to follow Jesus.

Keep praying. You can talk to God anywhere, and ask him to work in you and help you grow in your walk with him.

Keep thinking. There are lots of books and websites that can help you to keep thinking about questions you have about the truth and goodness of Christianity. We recommended some books at the start of the booklet. speaklife.org.uk/ and bethinking.org/ are two good websites for this.

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Couch to Christian



A course to help anyone start or grow as a Christian, including a day-by-day journey through the Gospel of Mark.

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There are three key elements to beginning to follow Jesus, and Couch to Christian has all three.

Bible: The Bible is God’s message to us, written down by people inspired by God so that we can know God. To hear God’s message, there is a daily Bible reading going through Mark’s Gospel, a biography of Jesus. Each day you’ll find a short passage from Mark’s gospel to read, and some simple questions to help you think about the message of the passage. If you don’t have a Bible, you can ask us for a copy of Mark’s Gospel or look up the passage on bi-blegateway.com Many people find it helpful to have a regular time for their Bible reading to build a good habit. It is common for people to aim to do this when starting the day, so that what they read and pray helps shape their day. But if another time of day works for you, that is fine.

Prayer: is talking to God. Though there is not a set rule for how you do this, there are patterns and practices that many Christians have found helpful. So each week there will be a prayer or a guide for prayer to help you talk to God

Fellowship: the Christian journey is meant to be in community with others, and each Sunday morning for October and November 2024 you can join others doing Couch to Christian and thinking more about Mark’s account of Jesus’ life together. Emmanuel Church meets 10:30am-12noon at Northstowe Secondary College. You are always welcome to visit, and to stay for free refreshments afterwards.

There is a fourth element for someone exploring religion: **Is this true?** So each week there is a link to a helpful video exploring some of the evidence for Christianity or answering some of the objections people raise to Christianity. If you want to read more on the evidence for Christianity, we can lend you books, including:

The new kingdom of Jesus

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Becoming a Christian is not a matter of country or family background. It is not a matter of being moral, or even spiritual, or attending church. Becoming a Christian means believing certain facts about Jesus, and choosing to trust Jesus as saviour (the one who dies to rescue us from sin and judgment) and Lord (the God who lives and rules forever). Romans 10:9: *If you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.*



Prayer: Here is a prayer you could say to God if you want to become a Christian.

Father God, I admit that I have often ignored you. I confess that I have acted selfishly towards others. I do

not deserve your love and rescue.

Thank you that you love me, and sent Jesus to die for me, paying the price for my sins. I trust in Jesus as my saviour. I seek to follow Jesus as my living Lord

Please live in me by your Holy Spirit, filling me with your love and peace, and helping me to walk day by day with you. Please change me to be more like Jesus in this life, raise me at the last day to enjoy life forever with you in your new creation. Amen

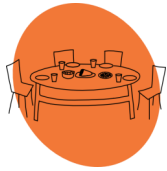
Is this true?

When Jesus' followers asked him how to pray, he gave them a pattern for praying that many people memorise as the Lord's Prayer (found in Matthew 6:9-13)

*Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation
but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power,
and the glory are yours
now and for ever.
Amen.*

Some people find it helpful to pause after each phrase, to say something to God in their own words on that theme.

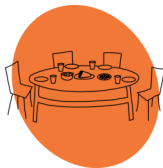

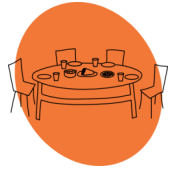

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Prayer: God wants us to be in conversation with him. We hear God in the Bible. And then we speak to him in prayer. So it is often helpful to talk to God about what you are learning. Some people find the ACTS summary for prayer helpful, and you could use it to help you talk to God after reading the Bible.

ADORATION- what have I learned about God and Jesus that leads me to admire and love them? Declare that truth to God.

CONFESSION- what have I learned about myself as a creature and as a sinner that I should admit to God? Say sorry for your sins.

THANKS- what have I learned about what God has done for me as Creator and as Rescuer that leads me to be thankful? (That might include that God is making himself known through the Bible.)

SUPPLICATION (ASKING)- what things do I want to ask God for, either as a result of what I have understood in the Bible, or what I don't yet understand? And what needs in my life and for those around me do I want to ask for God to be at work and changing?

(Christians say Amen at the end of praying. Amen means something like "this is the truth" or "I agree".)

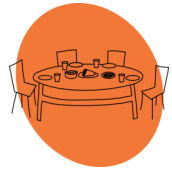

The Bible's songs are found in the book of Psalms. Many Christians will read a Psalm each day, and use it to help them pray to God.

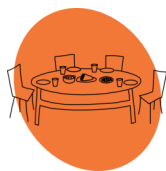
Is this true?

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Prayer: Confession

We can admit our sin to God and say sorry, knowing he forgives us through Jesus' sacrifice. There are no set words we have to use. But this prayer from the Book of Common prayer helps us see the depth of our sin problem:

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Is this true?
